




Celebrating 75 Years

The Woodend Garden Club proudly celebrated 75 years of gardening and fellowship recently. Members and guests enjoyed a wonderful lunch held at Rosebank Winery. Mayor Dan Gordon and Christchurch Horticultural Society President Rae King were inspiring speakers. Chris Sutherland was the MC for the day.

The idea of the formation of a Garden Club first originated at a meeting of the Spring Flower Show Committee in 1945. It was decided that the scope of the Club should be much wider. A general meeting of all interested was called and advice was given by a Horticultural Society representative as to the activities of Garden Clubs. After this meeting it was decided to form a Garden Club in Woodend. Yearly subscriptions were set at 2/6 which is roughly equivalent to \$9.15 today.

The Minutes from the second meeting held on 8 January 1946 stated:

"After a discussion of the afternoon tea question, it was decided to adopt Mrs Stalker's suggestion that members bring their own cup & saucer & sugar.

The Committee would fund tea, milk & biscuits at a charge of 3d per member". (3d = .92cents) War rationing made sugar both scarce and expensive.

Sprays were presented to Life Members, Past Presidents and the current President. Long service was recognised for the five longest serving attending members – Shirley Wheeler 1976, Brenda Batchelor 1981. Prue Baines 1982. Pauline Boyd 1990 and Judy Stewart 1990. The two longest serving nonattending members were also acknowledged -Phyllis Sheppard 1969 and Shirley Clegg 1971.

Members shared some interesting stories from over the years which included the enormous work the Club has achieved in the community, the displays and shows produced, past work with floral displays in the Christchurch Cathedral and city riverbank and their very successful entry in the Ellerslie Flower Show.

The afternoon concluded with the past and current Presidents (Shirley Wheeler and Brenda Batchelor) cutting the cake.

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

Residential Tenancies Amendments Act 2020 | Notice Periods

As promised here is my second instalment of the changes within the new Residential Tenancies Amendments Act 2020.

Let's talk about notice periods to tenants if you wish to sell a property which is tenanted.

These all refer to periodic tenancies, as a fixed term tenancy is still fixed for both parties, the difference being, that at the end of the fixed term a tenant can elect to roll over to a periodic tenancy, and the landlord cannot give notice that they want the tenant to vacate for no specific reason.

A landlord may give tenants 90 days notice that they require vacant possession of the property for the purpose of selling the property. However, landlords must be aware that they cannot start marketing the property for sale until after the tenant has vacated. and that following that the property must be for sale within a 90 day timeframe. A tenant can, at any time during this period, give the landlord 28 days notice that they will be

Under the old legislation upon a sale of a property going unconditional a landlord could give the tenant 42 days notice (plus 4 days postage) that they required vacant possession of the property. This has now changed and the landlord is now required to give 90 days notice upon the sale going unconditional that they require vacant possession. Again, the tenant can give a counter 28 day notice to vacate.

The big thing with the extended time following a sale going unconditional really comes into play with insurance as, here in Canterbury in

order to get finance, the financial institutions require insurance to be pre-arranged (due to earthquakes). However these policies are on hold pending settlement, but do not last 90 days, so in fact the offer of finance would likely become null and void, unless an extension was

I have had conversations with solicitors and spoken with a representative from one of the main insurance companies late last year regarding how all this is going to pan out. Unfortunately, they did not know either. I am working on finding out what is the best course of action, and when I do, I will report back!

If you find this all a little hard to figure out, please feel free to contact me.

Next time I will talk about some of the other changes to notice periods under the amendments act.



Alpine Pacific Touring Route

It's likely you've done parts of the Alpine Pacific Touring Route (APT) without even realising it - but we bet you haven't seen all of its hidden

The 450 kilometre road trip runs between Christchurch, Kaikoura and Hanmer Springs. It features Cathedral-like cliffs, forests filled with fairy doors, baby seals in the depth of winter and some of the country's very best wineries where you can sip away while chatting to the winemakers themselves

With Christchurch as your starting point, you can catch up on the ever changing city – walk along the new Avon River walkway (or grab a punt), hear the latest developments aboard one of the heritage trams or check out the stunning 360-degree views from the top of Christchurch Gondola.

Stroll back in time at Ferrymead Heritage Park - an early 1900s Edwardian township with restored cottages, shops, tractors, fire engines and model trains

Those after an adrenaline fix should not miss the Adventure Park – it's a mountain biker's paradise and here's a free tip – walkers can head up on foot before catching a free chairlift ride back down the hill.

First stop north of Christchurch must be Amberley. You're probably already aware of the town's reputation for good shopping – if not, go there and be surprised and while you're there you must visit Ruby Six.

Our top tip is don't miss Greystone -


is producing sensational wines that chef (and certified forager) Mel Wright pairs with fresh, unforgettable fare.





This is very easy to make and deliciously tender, just remember to buy a fillet that is uniform in size so it will cook evenly. Serve it with a glass of North Canterbury Pinot Gris.

HONEYED PORK FILLET (Serves 4)

- 2 Harris Meats Pork Fillets (approx. 250g each)
- ½ t garlic powder
- ½ t paprika
- ½ t salt
- ½ t pepper
- 1 ½ t soy sauce
- 1/2 C Foothills White Meadow Honey

Mix garlic powder, paprika and salt and pepper together and sprinkle on the fillets. Cook in a hot pan 2 minutes a side, remove from the pan. Then add the honey and soy sauce to the pan until combined. Add the fillets and simmer on low for five minutes until the sauce reduces by half and becomes sticky, turning the pork continuously. Be careful not to burn the sauce. Using a sharp knife slice the fillet into 1.5cm slices and place on the cauliflower mash. Drizzle the sauce over the fillet and serve with baby green beans.

CAULIFLOWER MASH

- 1 cauliflower
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- Good knob of butter
- 2 T sour cream
- 25g parmesan cheese
- · Salt and pepper

Cook the cauliflower florets and place in bowl with the garlic, sour cream, butter, parmesan, season with salt and pepper. Use a stick blender until the mash is lovely and smooth, add more sour cream if it is a bit dry. When plating up add a knob of butter.



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A HISTORY OF

The common muffin has quite a history dating back to the early 19th century where some sources suggest the "muffin" is related to the Greek bread "maphula" (a "cake baked on a hearth or griddle")

Other sources suggest it comes from Old French "mou-pain" ("soft bread"), which may have been corrupted into "mouffin". The word is first found in print in 1703, spelled moofin;[2] it is of uncertain origin but possibly derived from the Low German Muffen, the plural of Muffe meaning a small cake, or possibly with some connection to the Old French moufflet meaning soft (like bread).

Today, two types of muffins exist - the muffin (typically unsweetened) referred to as the English muffin (or flatbread muffin) and the more commonly known muffin (both sweet and savoury) that are individually baked sometimes known as American muffins or quickbread muffins. Todays muffins rely on bicarbonate of soda but historically yeast was used.

The use of the term to describe what are essentially cupcakes or buns did not become common in popularity until the advent of coffee shops like Starbucks. Recipes for quickbread muffins are common in 19th-century cookbooks. For many the standard was the Edmonds Cookbook however early celebrity bakers like Hudson and Hall's, Jo Seager to today's culinary influencers like Nadia Lim, Annabelle White and Annabel Langbein all




have at least one muffin recipe in their cookbooks.

Everyone has their favourite muffin and many a bakery, coffee shop or social morning tea can live or die by the quality of their muffins. Popular examples are the chocolate chip, the banana, the blueberry to the cheese and bacon and corn, to the tasty feta and spinach. The principal difference between a cupcake and muffin is cupcakes are 'dressed' or iced and typically always sweet.

Often muffin recipes can be a closely held family secret and are handed down through the generations and I have fond memories of grandparents spending wonderful moments in the kitchen with their grandchildren during school holidays handing down the recipe and techniques taught to them by their own grandparents and how these are made.



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Keeping It QUIET

Whether it's your noisy neighbours' barbecue or your teenager watching Netflix into the small hours -noise can be a big issue in many of our homes. So what can you do to make life a little more tranquil?



"Noise is increasingly an issue for many of us" says Christchurch-based acoustic consultant, Mark Lewthwaite.

Mark typically works on large residential developments and commercial projects where sound is considered an important aspect of a build. But it's also something that individuals should consider in the

People are getting fussier and

expectations are changing. In residential builds people are paying more attention to sound issues," says Mark.

Think About Design

So, if you're building or undertaking major renovations think about noise considerations early on. Contact the duty planner at your local council and ask whether there any rules around acoustic installation where you are building. These are typically in place if your home is close to a busy road or the airport for example and can have an effect on the type of materials used says Mark. For example, some places see Rigid Air Barrier (RABs) used in place of building paper to provide extra acoustic insulation and some people may run 'sarking' under their roofs.

Even if there are no specific rules around noise, remember it's you that will be living in the home. So if you think that traffic noise will bother you – ensure your architect and builder are aware of this and ask them for recommendations - types of cladding, insulation, doubleglazing are some of the solutions to consider.

Inside the home, good design is key to minimizing noise so again raise it with your architect in the planning stage. Some basic guidelines include grouping quieter areas and busier areas together – so bedrooms should ideally be separated from the living area perhaps by a corridor. Bedrooms that come off lounges or communal areas and are only separated by a door can be problematic.

Consider also the impact of all those functional things - like heat pump units outside windows or water pipes running through walls and take care with the placement of toilets. You don't want cisterns that sit on walls adjoining bedrooms for example advises Mark.

Cutting The Noise In Existing Homes

If you're looking to reduce noise issues in an existing home it can be a little trickier but there are some options. First think about what noise is bothering you and where it's coming from.

An additional layer of plasterboard on existing walls can reduce noise from an adjoining room. But be aware if the wall has skirting boards and door frames this will mean these will then sit differently, unless you adjust these as well. Insultation in internal walls is another option if you are removing plasterboard, pink batts or an equivalent will reduce noise travel.

If noise is travelling through doors then you should look at the door itself – often modern hollow core doors are very poor at blocking sound. But also look to see if there are any gaps between the door and the framing or underneath the door. "Minimising that undercut on the door is really important," says Mark. A good solution is some sort of door bottom seal – these are typically flexible strips of rubber or a brush strip attached to the bottom of the door.

Softening It Up

When it comes to the acoustics in a room and stopping noise reverberating then often soft furnishings can help – as they absorb sound whilst harder surfaces will reflect it back.

So, if you struggle to have a conversation over the clatter of knives and forks in your dining room, then easy measures you can take are things like putting down a rug, hanging curtains and choosing upholstered chairs or perhaps a padded, fabric banquette. Other DIY options that might help with acoustics include things like cork wall coverings or even timber battens.



A topical question - how do the new income tax changes for residential rental property affect me?

Firstly we don't have all the fine print yet.

Secondly the term "new build" hasn't been defined, but currently at the time of print the info to hand is:

New Builds – you can still claim interest as an expense against your rental income.

Also the Brightline Test is 5 years, meaning if you sell your property within 5 years of purchase you will pay tax on the profit.

Non New Builds – No tax deductible interest claim.

The Brightline Test is 10 years.

We don't feel this is reason enough to panic sell your property as:

- Interest rates are still very low. Most properties are now cash positive so that means if there is any income tax to pay, you will have available money to put
- Capital gains are very high currently.
- It is important to make sure you are outside the Brightline Test rules prior to
- You could have 2 years of ring-fenced losses to offset against potential annual rental property profits.
- Rents will most likely increase to cover "landlord tax".
- Interest claims are being phased out over 4 years so it's a gradual process.

The Four Winds Kristin Hannah

You have probably heard of, if not read, some of US author Kristin Hannah's previous books. She's the author of Firefly Lane (yes, this one's a Netflix series now), The Nightingale and The Great Alone. She's been writing for 30 years and she tells a good story.

Her latest book, follows Elsa Martinelli in 1930s Texas. She lives with her husband, her in-laws and her two children on a farm in the Great Plains and life is full of happy work. But when the drought begins and the crops start to fail Elsa and her family are soon struggling to survive in a

town that is fast emptying of people. Life is sweltering heat and stifling dust storms that darken the sky and send them indoors wearing gas masks and the only escape seems to be the promise of better things, including work, in California.

This is a story of character and Elsa is relentlessly tough despite the insecurities of her early childhood when her own parents showed her little love. She struggles on against an endless onslaught of misfortune finding ways to keep going for her and her children. They live in a tent; pick cotton for a few cents a day and the locals are none too happy to see this wave of refugees looking for work and using their resources.

The backdrop of this story stayed with me long after the last page. Hannah apparently spends around three months researching a novel before she starts writing. It shows here in the details of life in the Dust Bowl and the conditions that those farming families faced when they headed west in search of survival.

Sweeping backdrops aside, it's the strength of love and hope that are constants in this story. And, honestly, I found parts of it a little cheesy, particularly in the early stages when Elsa is reading classic novels and longing for romance. But it's a book that sweeps you along easily and as the story develops, it's well worth sticking around for.

Update from Hank

One thing we have learned and are still realising is how matters and circumstances outside of our borders have strongly influenced our lives.


Whether it be lockdown level because of what's happened in Auckland or whether we have to wait for months for delivery of goods and supplies due to what's happening overseas. We're fine! Why do we have to suffer because of others? I guess it's something we just have to accept and carry on. I said this before and I'll say it again, let's just worry about the things we can control and not things

One of the questions I've had recently more and more from clients is the increase in insurance premiums. This

is also partly influenced by what's happening overseas. Most of our insurances policies, all insurances including house and contents, are reinsured overseas. This means that in some cases up to 90% of insurances are covered by overseas based reinsurance companies. Because of that they set the rules, including what they charge our insurance companies for the benefit of having their claims paid. This in turn is influenced on what's happening on an international bases. It's determined by levels of claims worldwide.

The insurance that has seen the most increase in premiums is Private Medical Cover. This is a more local issue in that only a small part of Medical is reinsured. For the most part medical claims are covered by each insurance provider themselves. That has been influenced by a combination of increased medical costs and an increase in claims. The more people have medical cover the more claims are made. The more claims are made the more medical providers and resources are needed. That again has an influence on costs.

The second type of cover that has seen increases in premium has been disability cover such as Income Protection and Trauma claims. Again, more people have this cover, so, more claims. More claims, more costs. This is, to a degree, dependant on overseas trends, particularly for the larger and long term claims.



If you're finding premiums are getting out of control, then there are things we can do about that. There are options rather than just cancelling altogether. Sometimes it's better to have something in place rather than nothing at all. All personal risk insurances i.e. Life, Health and Disability insurance, go up with age. But with age often comes change in circumstances and as such needs for insurances change
