Essence Magazine were invited by Canterbury A&P Association committee member Graham Sidey to attend the taste testing for the annual Mint Lamb competition. As you can imagine it was hotly debated as to who would attend. They required a judge and a photographer. You will see in the photos who grabbed the

Normally held in conjunction with the Agricultural Show, the popular competition had a change of format this year, a new "ram breeders' class" added and a change of venue with the results announced at the Sheep Breeders' Club at Canterbury Agricultural Park on Friday

The competition is judged in three stages - Overall Carcass Yield and Hook, a combination of Overall Carcass Yield and Hook plus Tender Test, and a combination of stage one and two and the Taste Test.

52 lamb entries from as far south as Cave and as far north as Marlborough were

narrowed down to a top 12. There are three classes so it's the top four in each class that go through. They are then sent to Lincoln University to be 'tender tested' and then it was up to the panel of five judges to decide on taste. The Winner is decided based on an accumulation of points from stage one and two and the taste test to decide the winner of class three, then the overall Winner.

Class Three – Paul and Kay Gardner from Ashburton – with a Texel lamb

Overall Winner – Stu Campbell from Seddon – with a Longdown lamb

Interestingly enough three of the five Judges picked both of the winners!

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Where to from here?

Looking back to this time last year none of us had any idea of the chaos that would be 2020. However, as we near the end of the year, and with the likelihood of some COVID19 vaccines being available, 2021 is looking a whole lot brighter.

There has been a lot of commentary in the media of late about the change in market conditions, with almost every article or headline pointing to increasing prices and competition for a comparatively low supply of property. However, we are seeing a slight supply increase at the moment with the traditional spring surge of listings even though it is later than normal. This means that those that were feeling despondent about their chances to buy a home can now start looking again meaning we will probably see the volume of transactions staying high between now and the end of the year, crossing over into the

Because the factors influencing the market at the moment are unlike anything we've experienced in recent memory, it is much harder to predict where the market may head next. What is occurring at present though is the fundamental supply and



demand dynamic. It's not generally typical for both of these drivers to increase at the same time and the result is the increasing transaction numbers that are currently being seen

Short term, all indicators suggest that there will be a continuation of these listing levels as we progress through summer, but this will be accompanied by the banks voluntary tightening of the LVR restrictions which could well slow the price increases we have been seeing throughout the country. Certainly, the Government and the Reserve Bank are joining forces to curb this. With North Canterbury still having potential for growth and the new motorway infrastructure, we are still a popular option offering so many benefits to those who live here. Are You Aware Of This?

Did you know that if you have your rental property owned under a company or family trust, then you are not legally allowed to give tenants notice that you require vacant possession of the property for the purpose of you or a family member requiring the property to live in?

Chances are, you didn't!

Now this won't be a problem for a lot of rental property owners as they never intend to either move into the property themselves, or have family move in. However, there are a lot of New Zealand landlords who intend to rent their home out for a shorter period of time. Historically, this could have been because they intended to live overseas for a while (not so common just now), but of course there are many other reasons for wanting to do this.

Currently the legislation states that the owner of a property, or a family member, can give 42 days notice to a tenant on a periodic tenancy. From 11th February 2021, this notice period will increase to 63 days, however it will still be legal to give this

But, and it is a big but, if the property is owned under a company, or a family trust, then these entities are not recognised as 'humans" so they can't physically move into the home, therefore this notice would

I am in no way qualified to go into the pros and cons of property ownership under companies or trusts, but I definitely recommend that if you have investment

properties under this form of ownership. and if there is even a slim chance that you or family may at some point need to move into it, that you speak to your lawyer or accountant and look at changing this, before you need to!

This is yet another of those anomalies which are popping up under the residential tenancies act, and with even more legislation coming into effect next year, it has reminded me of how much we need to be aware of when owning rental properties.

Having said that, our Landlord Academy which has been running each Thursday evening in November, is a fabulous resource to help you understand the changes that are coming into force and it is not too late - we have recordings.



"YOU NEED TO HAVE A BIGGER PICTURE IN MIND TO GO CONFIDENTLY WITH COLOUR"

GET A PLAN

"My house has a lot of colour but there is a consistent colour palette – the colours all twine together," says Becky. "With the change to turquoise in the living room I had dropdowns [A4 printed colour samples] on the wall for about two months before we did any work on it." This means you can look at your proposed colours at different times of day, see how the light works on them and how they work with other things like your curtains, carpet and artworks she advises.

It can be hard to envisage how something will look over an entire wall – so if you're committed to change then crack out a test pot. The more paint you get up the easier it is to decide whether you like it.

Depth of colour is also an important factor she explains. All colours have a light reflectant value (LRV) from 0% to 100% with 0 being black that reflects nothing and 100 being white that reflects pretty much all light. A trick if looking for several colours to use across a home is to look for colours with a similar depth, or LRV. And be careful as some colours have 'sneaky little things' that they do, says Becky – for example, a grey might have a pink hue, in certain lights.

BUT WHERE TO START?

"You need to have a bigger picture in mind to go confidently with colour," says Becky. That means it's not just a case of going wild with the pink paint in one room and splashing colourful wallpaper around in another. Try to establish a palette of colours for your home and then weave those through your rooms.

If you have an existing wallpaper you love then use it as a starting point for a more widespread colour scheme says Becky.

Identify some of the colours within it and weave those through the rest of the house whether in paint or artworks or soft furnishings.

Pinterest can also be a great source of colour palette inspiration. Scroll through the images and check the ones that jump

From there – experiment a little. Soft furnishings, cushions, throws and even rugs are an easy way to try colours, patterns and textures. If you have colours you love in your wardrobe - then try bringing out that clothing item, drape it over a couch - as if it were a throw. Get a feel for how the colours work with other things in the room, advises Becky.

THE WONDER OF WALLPAPER

Wallpapers can be a great way to add some colour, texture and pattern to your home and there are so many beautiful examples available – from on-trend botanicals to geometric patterns. They can make a great feature wall for a bedroom or even in hallways where the length of space can often be a good spot to try wall panels that make up one, large single picture.

Different rooms lend themselves to different approaches. "In small spaces, like toilets, people are in and out and you can be more adventurous – you could just paper one wall but why wouldn't you do them all? It's a case of go hard or go home," says Becky.

There's a lot to think about with colour and it can "trip you up" sometimes says Becky. So if you have the budget it's worth getting a professional to help you out.

But ultimately – if you want to embrace colour in your home – get a plan and start experimenting.





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

versatility! My favourites instore also combine that rope trend! The cushioning is next level, the shape on the foot is so flattering. This style can be worn with - well everything!








Summer is also often party and wedding season - what do you recommend for

- 1 each large red and yellow peppers (capsicums / bell peppers)
- 2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- Flaky sea salt
- Freshy ground black pepper

Method

- To make the Charred Peppers: You can do these hours ahead if you like. Cut peppers in half, remove cores and seeds and cut into chunks. Toss them in olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Char-grill them on a heated barbecue hot plate (cast-iron griddle) or cook them in a hot medium-sized frying pan (skillet). Cook for about 10 minutes, turning frequently, until they are just starting to wilt and take on some colour.
- To make the Goat's Cheese Crostini: Slice the bread and grill it if I'm in a hurry (usually) I just wack it in the toaster. Yeah, well, it's Luca here, not Julie! If you want to give the crostini some punch, rub the toasted bread with a clove of garlic. The coarse crumb of the bread picks up little bits of garlic and gives the crostini a hot bite. I like it like that. Next, spread crostini with a thin coating of goat's cheese.
- Arrange crostini on a board and top with peppers. The juices are pretty tasty so pour those over too. Sprinkle with flaky sea salt, grind on plenty of pepper and drizzle with some good-quality olive oil. Add a drizzle of balsamic vinegar if you like and, if you've got a ma like mine who comes bearing gifts of homemade dukkah, sprinkle the hell out of it. Gobble up!

Recipe Notes

Chargrilling peppers (bell peppers / capsicums) enhances their flavour as the heat caramelises the sugars. Using tongs, put peppers directly over the flames of a gas hob or barbecue grill and cook until charred, turning regularly with tongs. Avoid piercing the skin if possible. When completely blackened, transfer to a plate, cover with paper towels and leave until cool. Slip off blackened skin — easily done using paper towels — cut peppers in half and remove core and seeds, conserving any juices. It sure would be easier to wash off the blackened skin under running water but doing this will wash away valuable flavour. Instead, wash your fingers from time to time to remove the build-up of sticky blackened skin.

Dukkah is a ground mixture of fragrant spices, nuts and seeds that can be used as a dry 'dunk' with bread and oil, as well as a flavouring and as a sprinkle.

Boy Swallows Universe

Trent Dalton

A novel of love, crime, magic, fate and coming of age, set in Brisbane's violent working class suburban fringe in 1983. Twelve year old Eli Bell lives with his mum Frances and stendad Lyle in the Brisbane suburbs. He seemingly has a normal Aussie childhood, tearing off on his bike, playing in the streets and worshipping the Parramatta Eels. Except for the fact that his older brother Gus is mute, having elected to give up speaking some years ago (after a traumatic event), his parents are drug dealers and his babysitter is a notorious ex-crim called Slim (based on a real life character also known as the Houdini of Boggo Road). That all



changes when Lyle is caught out by his boss doing a bit of extracurricular dealing and is dragged off by his brutal henchman never to be seen again, Eli's Mum is sent to jail and Eli and Gus go to live with their depressed, drunken father.

Despite all the violence and crime around him, Eli wants to grow up to be a good person and become a journalist, providing he can navigate his way through warring street gangs and heroin dealers, somehow survive school and find a paper willing to take him on. His love for his mother, stepfather Lyle, his father and brother shines out.


Trent Dalton has somehow managed to spin a yarn about a Brisbane boy growing up amidst poverty, violence and crime while infusing it with love, joy and humour. The little bluebird in the centre on the cover has a significant meaning for Eli, and the three word title and chapter headings reflect advice given to Eli when he meets his future news editor - that a story should be able to be summed up in three words! Not an easy read but I couldn't put it down!

War Gardens

Lalage Snow

A journey through the most unlikely of gardens: the oases of peace people create in the midst of war.

This is a beautiful book. Working in the world's most dangerous war zones, freelance war correspondent and photographer Lalage Snow has often chanced across a very moving sight, a testimony to the triumph of the human spirit in adversity, a celebration of hope and beauty: a war garden. Against a landscape of horror and violence it is up to the gardeners to maintain a modicum of normality and colour. For some, gardening is the way to achieve this.



In Kabul, the royal gardens are tended by a centenarian gardener, though the king is long gone; in Camp Bastion, bored soldiers improvise tiny gardens to give themselves a moment's peace and remind them of home; on both sides of the dividing line in Jerusalem families tend groves of olives and raise beautiful plants from the unforgiving, disputed landscape; in Ukraine, families tend their gardens in the middle of a surreal, frozen war.

War Gardens is a surprising, tragic and beautiful journey through the darkest places of the modern world, revealing the ways people make time and space for themselves and for nature even in the middle of destruction. Illustrated with Lalage Snow's own award-winning photography, this is a book to treasure.

Serenata and Remington Alabaster have been married for over 30 years. But life is becoming less pleasant for them – their professional worlds are moving on without them and Serenata is awaiting knee replacement surgery. She's appalled by the disloyal deterioration of her own body after a lifetime of slavish devotion to exercise. And to make it more annoying her husband, never much of an exerciser, has decided that he is going to compete in a triathlon, Mettle Man, egged on by a personal trainer called Bambi Buffer



All of which sounds a little like the light fluffiness of ageing chick lit and there are plenty of jibes at the universal unattractiveness of lycra clothing and Remington's triathlon training buddies. Serenata grimly puts up with the "tri club" invading her kitchen and talking hamstrings and titanium bikes.

But this is a story with a darker edge. Serenata is snarky and prickly and seems largely unwilling to understand any life but her own. And Remington's focus on fitness seems selfishly single-minded. This is not a particularly likeable couple behind closed doors and whilst there's a sense of the world moving on without them, they also don't seem to want to move with it - railing against anything slightly 'politically correct' and things they feel they are not allowed to say.

"I check everything I plan to say three times before I allow it out," says Remington at

Sometimes the characters might feel a little too much like they are mouthpieces for a particular world view. But predominantly this is a comment on the cult of exercise and ageing with some dark humour and thoughtful insights along the way.

Shriver is a superb writer and manages to make this readable and leave you thinking long after you put the book down. And that's a pretty good combo.
