



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To mark the hundred-year centenary in 2014, the volunteers at Rangiora Museum compiled information about various local men who went to battle at the time. They researched many of the WW 1 soldiers from the Canterbury area and from their files we put together some of their poignant stories and give you a glimpse of their wartime experiences.

To mark ANZAC day this year we have chosen to re-run two stories about North Canterbury locals, Pietro Max Luisetti and Frederick Philip Fendall. words: Pattie Pegler images: Rangiora Museum

Pietro Max Luisetti

"Let those who come after see to it that his name not be forgotten".

These are the words from the memorial scroll that was sent to the relatives of those killed in the First World War.

Vincent Luisetti remembers them from the scroll on the wall of his family home when he was growing up. It was dedicated to his greatgreat uncle Pietro Max Luisetti who was injured at Gallipoli. And it's a phrase that has coast, where he died on the 26th October stuck with Vincent as he's helped to piece together Pietro Max's story.

Pietro's father arrived in New Zealand in the late 1800s from his homeland of Italy. A renowned opera singer he set about farming with his wife, Marie, on the West Coast. The pair later moved to Christchurch and had four children. All of whom were orphaned by their parents' untimely death.

Pietro attended Burnham Industrial School, which was a state-run school similar to an orphanage. And then was fostered by a local couple, John and Jenny Petrie who were farming in Woodend. Later he leased land and was farming on his own account along with his brother Giulio.

It was in August 1914 that he enlisted in the Canterbury Mounted Rifles and two months later he left for war. Along with thousands of other soldiers from the South Island he left Lyttleton in October 1914 on either the HMNZT Athenic or the HMNZT Tahiti. The ships headed for Egypt, finally arriving in Alexandria on 3rd December.

At Christmas Pietro wrote a letter home. He tells how at night 'we don't get straw to lie on' but instead they slept on the hard ground. Meanwhile their Christmas dinner was bread, butter and cheese eaten whilst sitting on the sand.

Some of the regiment had headed off to see the pyramids, but others had stayed put in order to look after the horses. He also talks about how they had started to feed the horses barley straw as there was no wheat or steam ship, it had originally been built in oats grown in the Egyptian heat.

Some months later the regiment was diverted to the Dardanelles. And a letter from Pietro dated the 18th June 1915 paints an evocative portrait of the scenes that greeted them.

"Shells bursting on the hills and ground being thrown up sky high...the noise was now deafening, and the land seemed to be afire". What a terrifying sight that must have been for the young man and his

the place is well named" he says. From his war record it appears that Pietro disembarked at Anzac Cove on the 15th August 1915. Just a few

days later he received a gunshot wound to the foot. He was sent first to a hospital in Malta and then London. From there he was sent to a hospital in Torquay, on the south 1915 from a fever. He was buried in the local cemetery in Torquay. He was 27 years old.

Some eighty years later, Vincent Luisetti was in the UK and headed down to Torquay to find out some more about Pietro's final days. "My grandfather always asked me to do it, he was very fond of Pietro" he explains. Pietro's headstone had been paid for by his brother at the time. But the grave was not considered an official war grave and when Vincent visited it was in a state of disrepair.

"It was very early on in the war" he says, "and they weren't expecting war dead in Torquay".

However, he discovered that Pietro had received a good send off with a wellattended military style funeral. A local newspaper report at the time recounts how "About one hundred men of the 7th Devons...accompanied the body from the hospital to the Cemetery and a squad formed the firing party".

Over the years Vincent has pieced together other information about Pietro. He was very fondly regarded by his foster parents, the Petries. He was also a regular churchgoer and would often be seen riding his horse to

And today, that young man has not been forgotten by the wider family. Vincent named his son, Pietro Max.

Caption HMNZT Athenic 11, leaving Wellington on the 14th October 1914 for Egypt. The Athenic was huge, a 12,234 tonne the early 1900s for the White Star Line and operated a passenger and freight route from London to Wellington. When war broke out it was requisitioned for military use. According to records the ship carried 1259 men and 339 horses on this first voyage from Wellington to Alexandria in Egypt.

Frederick Selwyn Fendall

On Christmas day 1894 the Reverend Frederick Philip Fendall of Rangiora and his wife, Emma, had a double reason for celebration.

Not only was it Christmas but it was also the day their first child, Frederick Selwyn Fendall, came into the world.

At the time the family were living in Rangiora where Frederick Phillip had been appointed to St John's Anglican church. The couple went on to have Either way, he was returned to Egypt where three more children over the following years.

So Frederick Selwyn grew up as the eldest of four, he had a younger brother, Harold and two younger sisters, Lila and Hilda. At some point as a young man he moved up to the Taranaki area. On the 25th October 1914 he enlisted at Manaia and on his forms his employment was given as 'farmer' and his employer was a Mr JG Paterson.

Curiously the army records also give his date of birth as 21st December 1893, we don't know whether that was an administrative error or whether Frederick gave a false birth date in order to enlist earlier than allowed. But, regardless of the reasons, a couple of months later he was on board the HMNZT 14 - Willochra headed for Egypt with the 2nd reinforcements of the Wellington Mounted Rifles. They arrived at the end of January

From there Frederick was sent to the Dardanelles in June 1915 and at the end of August, he was reported wounded and sent to St Patrick's Hospital in Malta.

At its peak during WW1, Malta was home to 27 military hospitals and some 2000 soldiers a week were arriving from Gallipoli.

Frederick stayed there several weeks before being sent back to England. He arrived on 4th November 1915 at King George Hospital in London. From there at some point he was transferred to a convalescent depot

in Hornchurch, Essex, A small, handwritten note on his military record tells us that by March he was fit enough to be returned to action - "leaving this depot to rejoin unit 1-3-16".

I wonder what his feelings were then. Having seen the war first hand and been wounded, was he worried about returning, or keen to get back to the action?

he was transferred to the 2nd Brigade Ammunition Column. A note on his military record now describes him as 'gunner' rather than 'trooper' Shortly afterwards he was on the HMT Eboe heading from Alexandria to the chaos of the Western Front in France.

In France, at the end of October 1916, he fell ill with diarrhoea. He was considered sick enough to transfer back to hospital in England and on 8th November he was admitted to hospital in Brockenhurst. A month later they were filling out a 'Report of Death' form. Under 'disease' it states 'pleurisy with effusion' and gives the time of death as 'at 9.40am on 8/12/16'.

So, just 22 years after their son came into the world on Christmas Day, the Reverend Frederick Phillip and his wife Emma, back in Rangiora, would have spent Christmas in

A short piece in the Standard & Guardian newspaper, dated 13th December 1916, is titled 'Death of The Son of The Vicar'. It talks about Frederick Selwyn's life and concludes 'Members of other churches at Rangiora referred to the sorrow felt for the parents and family of the deceased young soldier'.

Frederick Selwyn Fendall is remembered locally on the war memorial in St. John the Baptist churchyard at Rangiora, on a brass plague near the altar in the church and on the Rangiora Borough and County War

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
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Is your house earning more than you?

Ray White Chief Economist, Nerida Conisbee, had a closer look at this and the results are pretty darn interesting. Over the past 12 months the median house price for New Zealand has increased by \$161,700 while the average household income across the country was \$97,760. It is quite likely that

incomes in nearly every major city

over this time your house was than you.

The likelihood of your home being the best income earner in your household is higher if you are in Auckland. Over the past 12 months Auckland's median house

> price increased by \$309,000. At the same time the annual median household income was \$107,692. The only city in New Zealand where the people that live in the house were earning

more than the house in 2021 was in Dunedin the median increased by \$55,000 compared to household incomes of \$84,136.

Obviously the biggest challenge is that it isn't possible to spend the capital gain you have made on your home without selling the house, unlike your household income which comes in the form of ready to spend cash. This concept is one we find really interesting and is often forgotten about when buyers are considering the merits of an investment property. While the yearly returns may not be as attractive as other investments, it's really important to

- That you are getting a return on the total value of the property, not just the deposit/equity you had available
- It's a great form of compulsory savings

unlikely with median house price growth slowing. In some places prices will also go backwards. Your house may have earned more than you in 2021 but that is less likely to be the case this year.

So what do you have to supply in a rental property vs what should you supply?

I deal with a lot of kiwis who are first time investors and I often get asked what they are expected to supply as a landlord. Although there is certainly legislation around this, I like to respond with not only what they must supply but what will make the property a better home for their tenants.

You may be surprised to know that a landlord does not have to supply window coverings. However it seems obvious that a tenant will require curtains/drapes or blinds for both privacy and warmth.

This leaves two options - either the landlord supplies them at their cost and then they 'belong' to the property or if the tenant is required to provide them then clearly they will own them and have the right to remove them at the conclusion of their tenancy. It is quite common for a tenant to replace an existing curtain in their home should they wish to - they simply store the landlord's ones and re-hang them before they leave but should they really be expected to pay for the

I guess it comes down to this - what would you expect if you were a tenant? I think we are likely to agree that window coverings are a no-brainer!

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to consider is a washing line. Again, not necessarily a requirement for a landlord to supply but that leaves the door wide open for only internal drying using clothes driers or drying racks, both of which can cause extra dampness inside a property. Once again, the benefit of installing a clothesline will far outweigh

The rules surrounding all of these chattels is however, that if they are supplied as part of the tenancy then they are required to be maintained during the tenancy by the landlord if necessary but if a tenant accepts the property without them then the landlord is not required to supply.


Overall, in my opinion, a tenant should be able to expect these basic things in their home supplied by their landlords. I believe it is not too much to ask and will

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
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

This month's recipe is a sweet treat ideal for dessert if you're entertaining at home, it can serve up to 12 guests.

Our Easter cheesecake can be made the day before and kept in the fridge, if you're after something really zesty swirl some lemon curd through the mixture after pouring it into the tin to give it some real

A couple of pointers, before pressing the base into the tin I grease the sides and bottom of the tin plus line the sides and bottom with baking paper. This makes the cheesecake easy to remove plus gives a lovely smooth edge when you peel back the baking paper. And when you cut the cheesecake make sure you use a sharp knife dipped in hot water as this gives a lovely clean edge. Between each slice dip the knife again in the hot water and wipe with a tea-towel. Serve a wedge garnished with whipped cream, some chopped Easter eggs and a sprig of mint.

Enjoy, if have any left keep it in the fridge, it won't last long. Have a safe and happy Easter!

Ingredients

- 200g digestive biscuits
- 80g butter, melted 500g cream cheese,
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- ¾ cup icing sugar
- 250g assorted Easter eggs (such as mini eggs), half roughly
- chopped 500ml cream



• Blitz biscuits in a food processor into a fine crumb. Add in the butter and pulse until just combined. Press into the base of a greased and lined springform cake tin and set aside in the fridge to chill for at least 30 minutes.







Nick grew up in Ohoka and the family home, unfortunately destroyed in an electrical fault fire, stood where the flying saucer now is.

It was a terrible time he says but now it feels like "a rebirth here, making something good out of something bad."

Today the flying saucer looks right at home on this rural section. A patio area with concrete pavers leads up to the steps and there's a spa, a sauna and a swimming pool in the outdoor area. Colourful chairs and tables make it perfect for an evening glass of wine al fresco and the outdoor lighting display is truly atmospheric with its changing colour.

This is the perfect spot for a getaway so it's not surprising that the Futuro home is now a successful Airbnb space. The guest book is bursting with enthusiastic comments and kids and grown-ups alike are enchanted with this dazzling space.

Nick spends a lot of time promoting it on social media and working on the space.

"If I get a booking at 3 in the afternoon, I get in my car and drive out to the property," he says.

And future plans include a games room and some extra accommodation in a vintage caravan.

When the cabin you want is hidden away on the West Coast with no road access – well, that sounds like one for the 'too hard' basket. Not so for entrepreneur Nick McQuoid – who came up with a plan and had a Futuro home helicoptered out in pieces before transporting it to Ohoka.

That was back in 2018. Then it was just a basic flying saucer shaped shell with no windows and no internal floors.

Futuro homes originate from Finland, where architect Matti Suuronen designed the first one in 1968. A family friend had asked him to design a ski-cabin and he came up with this flying saucer small, cosy and domed so that heavy snow wouldn't accumulate on it. Only 100 Futuro homes were made and only about 60 have survived and they seem to pop up in strange and unexpected parts of the world. They have developed a real following due to their collectability and their unique style aesthetic.

"I have always wanted to restore one," explains Nick. "I honestly have a genuine passion for these things, I love the colours, the design, the style."

Today that shell has been restored to its full 1970s glory - walls are painted in a vibrant purple Resene Daisy Bush, carpets are red, curtains are purple, cushions are vibrant oranges and yellows.

And there's some sleek design going on – the seating area runs around the circular wall, a distinctive moulded plastic yellow Zocker chair is one of the genuine 1970s pieces, the double bed tucked in the corner slides away to reveal more room space. It is an utterly unique space – with a 1970s futurist vibe that puts you in mind of old sci-fi movies or that vintage cartoon The Jetsons. It's really fun.

But restoring it was a big job. "I didn't understand the magnitude of it," says Nick. Luckily a team of friends, families and tradies Culmer Construction and RJP Electrical supported him through it. A friend, Jason Berger, helped with the joinery, particularly the tricky curved wall inside the Futuro which is made of layers of MDF. Nick's mother turned her hand to sewing and made the curtains and cushion covers. His uncle helped with landscaping. And Nick himself put in work wherever it was needed.

It might have been hard work but it was also not cheap and in order to finance the restoration Nick turned his hand to all kinds of jobs to earn extra funds. He charged Lime Scooters, drove for Uber, cleaned jail cells and offices and ran an Airbnb from his own apartment in Christchurch.



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
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
Your Garden this Month

With the frenzy of summer and early autumn harvests slowing down - it may feel like there is a lull in the garden this month. But, in the spent flower heads, the overlooked or forgotten


overripe produce, and the end of season herbs, there hides a second harvest - the harvest of seeds!

There is something special about saving seeds from your own garden, a feeling of being part of the magic of life inside each

Why seed saving?

In these days of uncertainty, saving

seeds is a decisive and positive act that is easy for anyone to do. Save seeds to:

- · Ensure seed security
- Have consistent seed quality
- Provide greater cultivar adaptability
- · Preserve heritage crops, and increase biodiversity
- Save money
- · Have fun!

How to save seeds:

Seeds are best collected when they are fully ripe, otherwise they might not have completed formation, or store well. Dry seeds can

Tomato seed fermenting step by step:

- 1. Choose a ripe tomato without any pests, diseases, or
- 2. Slice the tomato open to reveal the seeds and squeeze or scoop seeds into a small container.
- 3. Just cover with water and agitate (mix).
- 4. Cover the container with a mesh (to prevent insects from landing in the water) and let it stand on a kitchen bench top (not in direct sun) for a few days (2-3).
- 5. Strain the seeds through a fine mesh sieve rubbing them gently under running water to clean off all the gel and pulp.
- 6. Spread seeds on a paper towel to dry completely.
- 7. Rub the seeds from the paper towel and save in an envelope, bottle, or bag (label with the name!) and store in a cool, dark and dry spot until you are ready to sow next spring.

What to sow and grow in April in most areas of North (anterbury

The Canterbury region is rather large, with quite a few different climate zones scattered about - even the microclimate in your own garden can make a difference, so be sure to use the following as an ideas list only, and check seed packets or seedling labels for more information specific to your exact growing

- root crops such as beetroot, carrots, radish, salsify, swedes, parsnips, and turnips
- onion family like shallots, leeks, onion,

- leafy greens including amaranth, collards, endive, kale, lettuce, silverbeet, and spinach
- cabbage family including cabbage, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cauliflower and kohlrabi
- podding plants such as broad beans and peas
- flowers including calendula, Iceland poppy, viola, cornflower and sweet peas
- herbs like chives, chervil, coriander, dill, florence fennel, oregano and parsleyLet boiled water cool for a minute before using

Cover the brew while it is steeping with a lid (teapot), or plate (cup) so that the volatile oils released in the steam, condenses back into the tea

GOOD THINGS TAKE TIME

There are so many cosmetic treatments on offer these days, deciding where to start investing your efforts and money can be difficult. The active retiree runs a fitness class for the residents of Rangiora's Northbrook Villas, where she has lived since 2011.

"At the moment we are masked of course [due to the Covid 19 pandemic] but it's two days a week on Monday and Thursday. We do a lot of standing and stretching, and we try to exercise every muscle group in every session. We do some Pilates exercises, some yoga exercises, and a lot of stretching to improve balance and flexibility."

A passage from India

Making friends with a friendly elephant, watching a hilarious monkey troupe perform, and being immersed in the exotic sights, sounds, and vibrant colours of India, are some of the wonderful childhood memories of 93-year-old, June Dalziel

June was born in 1929, with her British (Indianborn) father, Eric Harris, a Police Commissioner at Mhow, and her South African born mother, Ada, a nurse. Tragedy struck the year after June's birth, when Eric died in a polo accident. "It was very sad for my mother after only two or three vears of marriage. We went to live with an aunt in Jubbulpore, who never had married and inherited her parents' house after they died."

It was while living at her aunt's house that June met the performing elephant she nicknamed 'Rajh'. "A visiting circus was in a big field next to the house, and the elephant had a sore foot. The owner asked if he could leave it tied to a tree for about a month while the circus went to a neighbouring town. I would take my doll outside to see Rajh every day and feed him leaves by hand from a big pile. I was very sad to see him go."

Like most British people in India during the 1930s, June's aunt and mother had a cook, cleaner, gardener, and a 'bearer' helping them to look after the grand home and large garden.

"We didn't have a telephone, so my aunt and mother would write little notes to friends to ask them out to tea. The bearer would deliver the note on his bicycle, then It was the most marvellous sound hearing the bring home the reply. That's how things were done in those days."

June had a treasured 'ayah' or nanny, named Buddi, who didn't speak a word of English, but taught her to speak Hindi. "My mother said I spoke of them making their way into the house, she says. Hindi before I spoke English. I loved it when Buddi dressed me in a sari, and she sometimes brought the neighbours' baby to our house, who I would push around the garden in my doll's pram."

The family didn't have a car, so June and her mother would bike everywhere. "We loved the bazaar with its beautiful racks of colourful saris, glass bangles, spices, and even false teeth. We had no idea where the man got them from, but

he would set the false teeth out on the pavement and people would come and try different ones in until they found a set that

Entertainers such as snake charmers and monkey troupes regularly did the rounds, putting on performances in people's homes in exchange for money.

"The monkey troupe was my favourite. There was a wedding scene, with monkeys playing the role of the bride. groom, priest, and dancers. The married couple would pretend to have a squabble and then kiss and make up. At the end, one of the monkeys would come up to my aunt with its hand out and a cheeky smile, and scuttle back to the owner with the money she gave it."

It was either very hot and dry, or very wet in India, says June. "It would get unbearably hot just before monsoon

season, when we would wheel our beds out onto the verandah and sleep under mosquito nets. rumble of the rain in the hills and knowing the monsoon was coming.'

show them to circus elephant Raih.

During the deluge, snakes would often get washed out of their holes, and there were many incidences "One day my mother went to pull a belt hanging off a wardrobe, only to find it was a snake."

June was home-schooled by her aunt, who was a former teacher and a 'real stickler' for grammar. "I loved to read anything and everything I could get my hands on."

By 1940, when June was 11, WWII was underway, and the winds of change were blowing through India, with independence becoming increasingly

June loved it when her treasured 'avah' or nanny, named Buddi dressed her in a sari.

ikely. June's uncle had retired to New Zealand with his wife and four children and encouraged June and her mother to join them. "It was quite traumatic, as I had to say goodbye to my friends and my ayah, who was like a second mother to me. The ship we sailed on to New Zealand was painted grey and had blackouts at night to avoid being torpedoed on the journey."

June and her mother joined their family in Nelson, and she started at Nelson College for Girls. Any lack of

formal education proved to be no hindrance, as June later became Dux of the College and won a scholarship to the University of Canterbury, where she gained a Masters of English. After university. June waitressed at the Coffee Pot in New Regent's Street in Christchurch until she had saved enough money to go on her OE with a friend.

While on the ship Rangitoto on the way to London, June was paired with a 'tall, brown Scottish farmer' named Harry Dalziel in a quoits competition, and the rest they say is history. The young couple later decided to marry and settle in New Zealand, with their first job on Glendhu Station near Motunau Beach.

"I was given a single man to cook for, and the only thing I knew how to make was curry. It was a real learning curve."

The couple had six children, five girls and a boy, sadly losing one of their daughters, Joanna, when she was just four years old.

June now happily lives independently at Ryman's Charles Upham Retirement Village in Rangiora and looks back fondly on her early years in India. She travelled back to India when she was in her 50s, and still loves the culture, festivals and 'kind, colourful' Indian people.

"When I think back, I had a very pampered life in India, with lots of lovely memories and fun times. It was a wonderful childhood."

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

My new partner has moved into my house. What can I do to protect them from claiming half if we break up?

As your relationship approaches the three-year mark, it is worth discussing with your partner how you envisage your property ownership in the future, particularly if you are bringing significant assets into the relationship. A Contracting Out Agreement gives you the ability to ring-fence parts of your property to ensure it retains its classification as "separate property" and does not fall into the "relationship property pool" which would be subject to equal division upon separation.

My partner and I have recently separated and have split our assets between ourselves, do we still need to see a lawyer?

If you and your partner have agreed on how your assets are to be divided, you should record this agreement in a Separation Agreement (otherwise called a Relationship Property Agreement). Having a Separation Agreement signifies that your relationship property matters have been resolved and cannot be revisited later down the track if things ever turn less amicable. A Separation Agreement needs to be witnessed by a lawyer who certifies that they have explained the effects and implications of the agreement otherwise the agreement will be void.

My ex-partner says that he/she's going to stop me from seeing the kids, what do I do?

If you and your ex-partner cannot agree to a parenting arrangement between yourselves, you can first try Family Dispute Resolution ("FDR") to resolve the matter. At FDR, you and your ex-partner will have the opportunity to discuss childcare arrangements with an independent third-party present who will facilitate the conversation.

If FDR is unsuccessful, you may need to apply to the Court for a parenting order. The Court looks at what is in the welfare and best interests and your children. This means that the same approach cannot be applied to every child and whānau. Instead, the Court must consider each child's particular circumstances and will also consider the child's views.

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
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
