

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Considering Selling? Should I Stay or Should I Go?

The property market over the past 12 months has experienced exceptional activity, the likes of which few have seen before and next to none had predicted.

Contributing to this has been a favourable lending environment with low interest rates. This, in combination with positive returns on residential investment property and perception of the long-term stability of the residential market in New Zealand has meant that those looking to buy have faced significant competition and those selling have had the benefit of a buoyant

More recently, we have seen a range of measures introduced by the Government, some expected and some that came as a complete surprise to many. This has led many to ask the question recently, is now still a good time to sell, or should I hold for conditions to change again?

The recently introduced increased LVR (loanto-value-ratios), the removal of interest as a tax deductible expense from residential investment and the extension of the "Bright Line" test to residential property, except for the family home. from five to ten years will likely have some impact on the market, although it may be more superficial than expected by many.

Typically, when changes are signalled or implemented, buyers will fall into three categories:

- Those that are unphased by the changes as they are looking for a long-term family
- Those that will now be more cautious due to the fear of overpaying if conditions change (typically those more highly leveraged in terms of lending)
- Those that see the opportunity in the uncertainty that these changes could create and are more motivated to purchase, albeit

While most economists believe that there will likely be some impact on the residential market as a result of these changes, most are predicting a reduction in the rate of price growth, rather than a reduction in values

What this means for sellers is that while conditions may improve marginally over the next few months, the upside will not be to the degree seen over the last 12 months, therefore reducing the risk of potentially underselling if you take your property to the market now. Not forgetting that this risk could be massively reduced by choosing the right sales method and the right salesperson. Conversely, those that wait to see what happens potentially increase their risk of being exposed to a flattening or declining market in the slightly longer term

Residential Tenancies Amendments Act 2020 | Notice Periods

In this, part three of my series regarding the Amendments Act, I talk about the other new notice periods now required to be given to tenants when vacant possession is required

Fixed term tenancies will, as a whole remain the same with the end date of the fixed term remaining. The one difference to this however is that at the conclusion of the fixed term the tenants may decide to either renew their tenancy, roll onto a periodic tenancy, or move out, giving 28 days notice. A landlord will no longer be able to give "no reason" notice to end the tenancy.

When working with a periodic tenancy, a landlord may give the tenants notice that vacant possession is required as they wish to move into the property, this has changed from 42 days to 63 days. Notice can also be given due to major repairs or renovations being carried out the notice period for this is 90 days.

The notice that a tenant is required to give a landlord to vacate has also changed from 21 days to 28.

It is important to note that during a fixed term tenancy, landlords can give either of the above notices as long as the vacate date falls on or after the end of the fixed term tenancy. For example, if the landlord needs to move into their

rental, they could give 63 days prior to the end of the

RayWhite.

Last time we talked about the notice required when selling a property, so to recap, 90 days is now required upon the sale going unconditional, or alternatively landlords can give 90 days notice that vacant possession is required as they will be putting the property on the market for sale.

It is important to ensure that the correct notice periods are given to avoid any potential problems down the track. As always education is the key.

> Step into the home of Rangiora-based interior designer, Andrea Robertson, and it feels almost tropical. Bright, white wood panelling meets wallpaper with lush green leaves and pops of red colour. A high ceiling is punctuated with a ceiling rose and a clear glass lightshade and beside a wooden bookshelf sits a large, leafy houseplant.

"This is Fiji, it's my happy place, it's what I see when I wake up in the morning," says Andrea. It's also a testament to her own hard work – she made all the wood panelling herself with her "bare hands and a drop saw."

When Andrea and her husband, John, first saw this 1935 house, five years ago, it was dark, damp and the roof leaked. But they saw the potential and bought it anyway. The first thing they did was to clear away some of the large trees outside to let the light in.

Then water started to come through the light fixtures in the ceiling - "and that was the point," says Andrea, when they really did wonder if they'd done the right thing. They replaced the roof, revamped the kitchen, replaced the windows with double-glazed white aluminium frames. And clearly they did do the right thing -

employment. Then one day, during a routine breast self-examination, she noticed some dimpling on the small amount of remaining breast tissue she had left. "I pushed for answers and it turned out I had the same type of Stage 1 breast cancer again, which thankfully had not metastasized anywhere else. If I hadn't known that dimpling was a sign of breast cancer, it could have been

Feeling disillusioned after all she was going through, Amber started to investigate complementary cancer treatments, and came across the Sanoviv Medical Institute in Mexico, a state-of-the-art hospital, which combines conventional, alternative and integrative programmes to treat a range of diseases including cancer. "I was going to take out a bank loan to go on the three-and-a-half week cancer programme at Sanoviv, then my friends and family really got behind me and through a range of amazing fundraisers, the whole trip was funded. It took away a huge stress.'

Amber went to Mexico in between her second surgery and targeted radiation. "I went through an intense detox programme and a complete rebuild of my immune system at Sanoviv, with lots of different treatments and therapies, alongside psychological, chiropractic, dentistry, nutrition, and health and wellbeing support. My body changed miraculously. I had never felt more healthy or healed."

Throughout all this time, Amber was regularly posting on her Facebook blog, 'When things went tits up', with her inspirational and frank posts demystifying the breast cancer experience and encouraging women to selfexamine their breasts monthly. "I try to educate people about the importance of self-examination and knowing the signs of breast cancer beyond a lump. We also need to be our own best advocates. I know of women who were told they were too young to have cancer or it was passed off as

Many women have told Amber that because of her blog, their lives were saved, or they have been inspired to start breast self-examination. Amber won a Kiwibank Local Hero Award and Canterbury Braveheart Award for her incredible initiative. She is full of praise for organisations like Shocking Pink, which supports women under 45 with cancer, and Sweet Louise which supports people with metastatic breast cancer. She says it is also important to remember that 25 men get breast cancer in New Zealand

Three years on, a CT scan has shown Amber is cancer free. She is working full time and enjoying life. "I have Ava, the most beautiful dog in the whole world, my career is back on track, and I'm on the journey to finding real love, both internally and with a best mate. It's my time now."



Your to-do list for the Autumn garden

Garden tasks this month

While there may still be some produce to harvest from summer crops, most warm season annual edibles have done their duty for this season. Clean up and feed empty garden beds before sowing or planting cold season crops. Mulching helps keep in soil moisture, and keeps plant roots safe from surface frosts.

PLANT OUT SEEDLINGS: Cauliflower, Celery, Collards, Florence Fennel, Kale **SOW SEEDS:** Corn Salad, Lettuce, Mizuna, Mustard, Pak Choy, Peas and Snow Peas, Radish, Shallots, Spinach, Turnip

Sowing and planting

PLANT: Garlic

The Canterbury region is rather large, with quite a few different climate zones scattered about – even the microclimate in your own garden can make a difference, so be sure to use the following as an ideas list only, and check seed packets or seedling labels for more information specific to your exact growing conditions.







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Top Tip:

Plant garlic early! You can plant your garlic into prepared beds in May. Many growers have found that starting garlic earlier than the traditional "shortest day" in June, means that by the time pesky rust issues lay the plants low in summer, when it comes to harvest time around Dec/Jan, the heads of garlic have well-formed cloves and are of a better size.

Did you know?

Tomatillo, Physalis ixocarpa grows well in Canterbury. This annual makes green (or purple) tomatolike fruit encased in a papery "lantern", similar to groundcherries aka Cape Gooseberries (just bigger). Harvested before the frosts, the fruits can be roasted to perfection and blended with other key ingredients like chillies, garlic, onion and lime to make Salsa



Herbs, Flowers and Fruit

Herbs that can be planted now include chives, coriander, mint, oregano, parsley, rocket (warmer areas), rosemary, sage and thyme.



Flowers for the veggie and herb gardens to plant in May are calendula, cornflower, phacelia, poppies and viola. Bareroot roses are in store soon for winter planting, so prepare beds for new roses.

If you still have not put in your spring flower bulbs, this is probably the very last chance to get a good show this coming season.

A good number of fruit trees and berry bushes can be planted in May. Look out for delicious cultivars of apples, pears, citrus, feijoa, raspberry, blueberry and


strawberries. Remember to check pollinator partners if your fruit tree needs cross pollinating. Bareroot fruit trees should start appearing in garden centres soon.

Top Tip:

It's always better to plant more than one blueberry – even the ones that are selfpollinating will end up giving a far greater yield if they have a pollinator partner.

Final thought

Before raking up all the leaves from your deciduous trees, or ripping out spent flowers, take a moment to investigate the critters that may live in your garden that need those leaves or twigs as hide-outs over winter or who perhaps lay their eggs in the leaf litter. Biodiversity is important in an organic garden.

We're all after comfort food when the seasons turn and this month's Lamb, Kumara & Spinach Coconut Curry will certainly be one to add to your repertoire.

Selected from our Something's Cooking Series, this curry is so easy, even the kids can make it! Cooked in the slow cooker it can be prepared ahead and you'll come home to the aroma of dinner, what could be better? You could use any cut of meat, pork, chicken or beef and if you want to make it meat free use chickpeas. Serve it up with naan bread and rice.

Ingredients (Serves 4-6)

- 4 lamb shoulder chops
- 2 Thsp Pams Pure Flour
- 2 onions, finely sliced
- 1 Tbsp Pams Mild Curry Powder 1 tin Pams Coconut Milk
- 600g orange kūmara, peeled and cut into chunks
- 120g baby spinach leaves

Method

- Preheat the slow cooker to low. Remove any excess fat from the lamb shoulder chops. Dust the chops with the
- Heat a splash of oil in a frying pan and brown the lamb pieces on each side. Set aside.
- In the same pan add the onion and fry until soft, add the curry powder, stir well, add the coconut milk, ½ cup water and the salt, then pour into the slow cooker.
- Add the kūmara, cover with the lamb pieces, and cook on low for 6 hours or until tender
- Add the spinach and allow to wilt, then serve.
- Top tip: This is delicious served with rice or roti. Add some chopped chilli to the mix if you prefer things a little spicy!


Kitchen

The Essence office kitchen is heavily coffee focused. But this afternoon it smells fantastic. It's been taken over by a real-life chef in a pinstripe apron whisking away, with the calm confidence of someone who knows exactly what they're doing.

And Andrew Frith of *Oui Chef* sure does. With 25 years' experience as an executive chef and a resumé that includes Michelin starred restaurants and supervachts – well, let's just say the Essence team are pretty excited about this taster session. We linger around the kitchen sipping wine, peering at dishes and chatting to Andrew. It must be annoying but he doesn't skip a beat, taking freshly baked seed crackers from the oven; whisking the 'beurre rosé' in the frying pan; delicately slicing the cornichons and answering our completely unrelated questions about how to cook croissants.

We gave Andrew a list of our dietary restrictions. Someone is gluten free, someone is allergic to soy, someone else is not good with dairy. This is no problem for him. He focuses on seasonal, local ingredients and shops on the day creating amazing dishes from what is available at the market and taking any special requirements or allergies into account. All the fish and seafood he cooks for us is sourced from the North Canterbury

Our first dish is buckwheat blinis with cornichons, smoked salmon, fresh lime and acidulated cream (whipped cream with a squeeze of something sour in it – you can use lime or lemon juice or even vinegar – we're learning as well as



Next up is a dish of prawns and scallops seared in the beurre rosé sauce. It's basically reduced wine with aromatics and butter Andrew tells us. How can something so simple taste so good? Dorothy hurries to take photographs before the food disappears. The prawns are superb, the

scallops melt in your mouth and several of us try to spoon any leftover beurre rose into our mouths with our forks. Don't judge us - it was too good to waste.

As the sun goes down and wine glasses are refilled Andrew appears with the final plate. Bite-sized, handmade dark chocolates with a hint of lemongrass oil. They're chocolatey and creamy and delicious

Not only was the food amazing, but Andrew has taught us some things along the way – sharing his expertise and knowledge and leaving us free to drink wine, chat and ask questions. This has got to be the perfect way to do dinner

Notes From An Apocalyse Mark O'Connell

Books come and go and some of them you read and enjoy but almost instantly forget. Others stay with you and Notes From An Apocalypse has been one of those for me.


Released last year this non-fiction work from Dublin-based writer Mark O'Connell opens with him watching a video of a starving polar bear on his phone, whilst his young son is watching capering cartoon bears on television. And he struggles to reconcile those two images – one so joyful and one so downright depressing.

The book is really an exploration of climate change, the notion of the apocalypse and O'Connell's own anxieties.

Wanting to look his anxiety and this "future-dread" in the face, O'Connell seeks out people and places that confront it. His explorations take him from viewing bunkers, "End times real estate", in South Dakota to the radioactive landscapes of Chernobyl. He meets 'preppers' in the US, contemplates Elon Musk and his desire to colonise Mar and heads to Wanaka to find out about some of the bolt-holes being bought up by overseas billionaires. He delves into history and politics and capitalism and life.

And if all this sounds a bit depressing, well, yes and no. O'Connell is a superb writer with a great turn of phrase and there's a wonderfully dark humour throughout. He's honest and self-deprecating and a wonderful guide through a dark world.

If you've ever read a headline about rising sea levels or mass extinctions and been left with that vague but consuming sense of anxiety – read this book. It's fascinating, topical and stays with you long after you've put it back on the shelf.



The Wild Silence Raynor Winn

This is the sequel to The Salt Path, and is a second beautifully written memoir, in which the author Raynor Winn explains how the real challenge was what to do next. Moth is still alive and The Wild Silence is an attempt to wrestle with her conflicting feelings. It delves deep into Winn's past, covering her childhood as the daughter of a tenant farmer and follows her life as she struggles to deal with the progress of Moth's disease and with the illness and death of her mother. Throughout it all she retains her faith in the importance of having an almost visceral connection to the land. Raynor is a wonderful storyteller – she is lyrical, almost poetic in her descriptions of the landscape, sky, wildlife, flora and fauna.

She says, "One of the biggest things we had learnt while walking the salt path was to live in the moment. We learnt to stop worrying about the future and what horrors it might hold and appreciate what we have right now – and I found that really quite hard to do once we went back to living under a roof because what had given me the strength to feel that way and to cope with everything that was happening was being out in the natural world."

She would find herself hiding behind the converted chapel in which they now lived to avoid talking to people, begging Moth to speak to them so that

she didn't have to and, when things got really bad, erecting their old tent in their new bedroom and sleeping in it. Adding to the stress was the fact that Moth's disease was continuing to progress. The turning point in The Wild Silence comes when she and Moth are offered the chance to live and work on another farm, albeit one owned by somebody else. This offer required trust, which was a hard call for a couple who had been badly betrayed by a friend in the past, but it also seemed to offer the wonderful possibility of hope and a leap of faith for this brave pair.

The final chapters of the book are about Raynor and Moth's trek with friends on the Laugavegur Trail in Iceland. The trail covers a savage rock-strewn landscape of ash, boulders and obsidian, much of it the result of the 2010 eruption of the unpronounceable Ejyafjallajökull. This part was almost an adjunct to the book. However, as with the Salt Path, this was another challenge they embraced. I loved this book. Raynor and Moth's extraordinary deep connection to each other and to nature is a sheer inspiration.



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
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
