GREEN HAYES

Emporium & Coffee Cart

Wander through the doors of the Green Hayes Emporium and step back in time.

One of Temuka's hidden gems, the Green Hayes Emporium is a treasure trove of antiques, retro pieces, and recycled furniture. From sofas and cabinets to crockery, furniture and toys, this funky store has something for everyone.

The Green Hayes Emporium is located inside the historic Green Hayes homestead at 45 Milford Clandeboye Road in Temuka. Built by pastoralist John Hayhurst in 1881-2, the house was one of the first homes in South Canterbury to have electricity. Owner Jane Sutherland has lived in the homestead for the past eight years, and opened the emporium a year ago. The self-proclaimed collector of the unusual runs the business alongside her husband Trev and

"It's called an emporium because we have really unusual things, really different to what you would find anywhere else.

For a lot of people, when they come in, it brings them back to their childhood. It's a bit of a destination because it's not on the beaten track, but everyone that comes through loves the atmosphere," Jane said.

The pieces in the emporium have been sourced by Jane over the years, with some items being given a new lease of life by the

"We recycle a bit of stuff and do our own upholstery. We find stuff, we recycle it, we upholster it and reutilize it into a really cool

The emporium also sells large concrete statues and pots that are made on-site, and has kinetic sculptures for sale.

"I have Dave who makes and supplies moving sculptures, so I am just putting them out now. He makes really unusual things which are very

Jane has also just opened up another part of the homestead, the garden area for large indoor plants.

"I have always had indoor plants but now I am sourcing really huge ones. They are not everyone's cup of tea, but the house plant people will love them, and I am going to keep them at a reasonable price. I have some Ruby Rubber plants that are about the size of a 9-year-old, and I am getting some big palms that people can have indoors or

A trip to Green Hayes Emporium is not complete without a cup of coffee and a slice of cake from the coffee cart. From a renovated wooden wagon, Jo and Trev serve up cups of delicious coffee, milkshakes, soft serve ice-cream and a range of tasty treats.

"You can have a potter around, have a coffee and just take time to smell the roses," Jane said.

Whether you are looking for something specific, just fancy a browse or need a new coffee spot, a trip to this little piece of vesterdav is well worth a visit.

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

WAIMATE villa

When Steph and Rick Stevens stepped through the front door of their Waimate villa, they knew straight away it had to become their next home.

"[The] preserved character of the home is not something you comes across often. It has beautiful high windows which flood the spaces with sunlight. There's stained glass throughout that is not garish, just the perfect colours and amount of detailing. And I love the hallway which has an arch and ornate mouldings on each side. The large, central hallway is kind of what sold me on the house," Steph said.

Within a week of seeing the 1920s weatherboard villa, the couple had put an offer in to purchase the property. A month later they had sold their Christchurch home and packed their bags. And now, two years have passed and the couple, along with their children, 15-year-old Rhys and 14-year-old Savannah, are loving their new life in Waimate.

"It was a reasonably quick decision made. My husband and I tend to not mess around when we know something is right. It's been that way since the beginning, we were engaged after three months, and married six months later so we make up our minds quickly," Steph said.

"[Waimate is] small compared to what we are used to. We are originally from Atlanta in the United States and had lived in Christchurch for over 15 years, so it's certainly been a change, but we're really enjoying it. We've made some great friends here. We socialise and see friends more frequently here than we did when we lived in Christchurch; it's easier to get around and visit people. And when you go to a local restaurant or pub

there's usually someone there that you know, and we really value that."

Since moving into their stunning four-bedroom villa, the family have been taking time putting their own unique stamp on the home

"We have just renovated the kitchen. It's mostly a flatpack kitchen that I designed myself, during the lockdown last August, and then ordered through Bunnings. My dad put it all together and I helped install it. He came down [from Christchurch] for about two weeks, and we stripped everything out and rebuilt it, which was an interesting experience in an old home."

"A lot of the features in the home are original aside from the previous kitchen, and a small laundry that has been added on. But other than that, the rest of the house is pretty original to the 1920s form, found through moderate research."

Steph said the family had spent quite a bit of time painting the interior of the home which boasts views from the kitchen of the famous Waimate landmark, the White Horse.

"Every wall of the house was covered in wallpaper, not uncommon in lath and plaster home but it actually seemed untouched and in such good nick, so we just painted over it, saving hours of stripping it all back."

The next items on the renovation to-do list include the laundry and a second bathroom.

When it comes to home decor, Steph said the Stevens' home was full of pieces that have been curated over time.

"I don't have a particular decor style, but I do love colour. I am really inspired by fabrics and artwork. In my kitchen I have a framed William Morris print. I knew I wanted a green kitchen but after finding this print, I pulled colours from it, exploring additional shades of green and blues in the open space that combines with the dining room."

Steph owns Rewind, a clothing shop that specialises in selling preloved designer clothing. The central Queen Street shop incorporates the popular saying 'Reduce, Reuse and Recycle', which is a philosophy Steph applies to her everyday life, including when it comes to furnishing her home.

"I love frequenting antique stores and op-shops, and much of my home decor is second-hand, handmade or re-worked in some way. There's not a lot in my house that is new. Most pieces have been collected along the way, and I don't tend to make a purchase unless I know that I have an immediate use for it, rather than stashing it away."

Situated on a quarter acre plot, the villa has a well-established garden which is home to some beautiful birch trees and roses that were planted by the previous owner.

Admittedly not gifted with green thumbs, Steph and Rick enjoy their outdoor space year-round but have no immediate plans to make any major changes to the garden, although Steph does acknowledge "there's often enthusiastic family discussions and some fun ideas being thrown around in regard to outdoor projects, but updating the interior is, and always was, our first priority".

New recruits at Medi Clinic

Medi Clinic has employed two excellent new recruits to help in its busy practice. Michelle Peperkoorn (left) originally came from Dunedin and Hayley Hooper (right) from Pukehina in the Bay of Plenty. Both started working at Medi Clinic at the beginning of this year

Michelle did her nursing training in Whangarei after which she spent 6 ½ years working at Auckland City hospital, followed by 20 years at Middlemore. She has her Masters in Nursing and she has taught Advanced nursing papers for post-graduate diplomas at both Auckland and Otago Universities. In 2018 Michelle and her partner then moved to Waitati, where they bought the 170 year-old store, which has been a shop, an art studio and a movie theatre in its day. It is now a happily lived-in family home, from where Michelle commutes to work in the Medi Clinic from Monday to Wednesday every week.

Michelle never planned on being as nurse, with her mother and sister both being nurses. However, she likes making people's lives better and listening to their stories, so nursing was an obvious career path. She has also worked with the NZ Medical Assist Team and has been deployed in the South Pacific- to the Solomon Islands following flooding, to Fiji and Vanuatu after cyclones and to do Covid vaccinations in Rarotonga- so Michelle has a wealth of experience in different nursing fields.

Hayley is a paramedic. She was born in the Bay of Plenty then her family shifted to Nelson where she did her schooling, after which she did the first year of a Health Science degree at Otago University. Hayley then became a courier driver in Dunedin before moving to Timaru where she started as a volunteer for St John while still working fulltime as a courier. She remembers being told to slow down on corners for "patients now, not parcels!" This led to her deciding to do her three year Bachelor of Health Science in Paramedicine and in 2015 she became a fulltime paramedic with St John in Auckland. She married a fellow paramedic who sadly died young of prostate cancer in 2020. Her parents had moved to Timaru, so Hayley came south and worked fulltime for St John in Timaru. She needed a GP and hence her meeting Anton Van den Bergh and her being employed at Medi Clinic. Her job involves primary care in people's homes and triaging patients for assessments, whilst still doing casual work for St John.

Hayley intends to continue studies in the future, but she is enjoying learning from the Medi Clinic family in the meantime. She is hoping that having more regular hours and moving away from shift work will allow her to join in more social activities again, such as music and sports, as well as making time for escaping into the hills for a ski or a hike.

Both women are enjoying the slower pace of life in South Canterbury, being near family and the cheaper cost of living. However, they both miss the hot summers, the warm water for swimming and the very different lifestyle. In the meantime, they are loving their jobs at Medi Clinic and we are the richer for having them in our midst.

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New chapter for

SOUTH CANTERBURY MUSEUM

The South Canterbury Museum is about to head into a significant new chapter of its own history.

Having started in a house on the current site in 1952, the Museum has expanded to have several hundred metres of display space, and three floors of behind-the-scenes collection storage. Now it is planning to shift all of the exhibitions, education area and public programmes spaces to a new site beside the Theatre Royal on Stafford Street.

This new facility, planned to open in late 2023, will provide more space for these public-facing activities, along with much better access and a closer link to historic parts of downtown Timaru. The existing Perth Street building will be redeveloped, housing the Museum's unique collections, and making them accessible for research.

The South Canterbury Museum is a community service provided by the Timaru District Council. It has always been a great place to explore the region's heritage. Locals and visitors can experience aspects of our region's stories, as well as take part in events and public programmes. The Museum is a rich resource for anyone wanting to investigate historical topics or research their family tree.

The Museum's focus is on the natural and cultural heritage of our region – nature, history and culture. Like other parts of New Zealand, our region has its own distinct heritage. This includes our landscape, from towering mountains to the sea, and the wide range of landforms found here. It includes the fossil record; evidence of past lives linked to how the land has changed from being former sea floor to a forested land full of now-extinct moa and many other fascinating creatures.

Our region's human history begins around 900 years ago when settlers from Eastern Polynesia arrived, the first known people to do so. The centuries that followed saw the development of Māori language and culture, with local traditions of settlement, migration and change. The first Europeans to live here were whalers, followed by run holders in the 1850s, with the last 170 years seeing a massive change as thousands of immigrants arrived. transforming the landscape and culture to what we have

The Museum's collections and displays tell the stories of our geological past, our unique wildlife, local Māori

heritage, European settlement and how the region has taken shape over the last 150 years. The collection includes several thousand natural history specimens, hundreds of archaeological items representing taoka Māori, and thousands of artefacts, photographs and archival items representing the last 170 years of recorded history. These collections are the raw material for the Museum's programmes of research, exhibition, education,

The Museum team work hard to catalogue every item, and ensure that it is kept safe to avoid damage or deterioration. The collections act as a library that can be drawn upon for the Museum's programmes.

One of the prime uses of the Museum's collections is in exhibitions. These tell our region's heritage stories – landscapes, life forms and people. In addition, the Museum currently features a small changing exhibition area that hosts changing displays from both within the Museum's collections and from elsewhere.

A small team of part-time teaching staff at the Museum make up the Heritage Education Service, who develop and facilitate education programmes for local schools. Funded by the Ministry of Education, more than 5,000 students take part in these programmes every year, either in the Museum, at heritage sites or other facilities that link to the Museum's programmes.

The South Canterbury Museum is a place where things happen, and people can be involved. The Friends of the Museum, set up through the Museum's founder the South Canterbury Historical Society, enables members to take part in opening events, historic site trips and to be kept informed of Museum happenings. The Museum holds a range of family events through school holiday times, as well as organising talks and events for general audiences such as the annual retro rock concert outside the Museum. The Museum Explorers Club, a free membership club for primary school students, has more than 2,000 members who are rewarded every time they visit the Museum.

The South Canterbury Museum is open Tuesday to Friday from 10am to 4.30pm, and on Saturday, Sunday, and public holidays from 1pm to 4.30pm. For more information, visit the Museum online here www.museum. timaru.govt.nz. You can also follow the South Canterbury Museum on Facebook and Instagram.

"Waimate felt a bit too small for what I wanted, and Timaru had a wider range of customers. Now I get customers from





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

















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JANFRE GIBBS Blue Light Advocate

Jan Gibbs always wanted to join the police force, which she duly did two years after leaving school. After six months at Police College in Wellington she was posted to Timaru, where she has lived ever since. She married a local lad in 1985 and her son Jack was born in 2000.

Jan's first ten years were spent policing on the front line, followed by a stint with Operation Shovel in the Tactical Squad, where she was dealing with gang issues. Then it was two years in the Watch House followed by three years working as an Intelligence Analyst, following up local 'corridors of crime'. Her next job was as a Youth Education Officer in schools, a job she really enjoyed.

Jan took maternity leave in 2000 with the birth of her son and since then she has been a Youth Aid Officer. This is a hugely fulfilling job which involves Youth Justice issues and Care and Protection of our young people. Youth Aid deals with children and young people under

the age of 18 who have offended, are on the verge of offending, are subject to Care and Protection measures, or just need help to go in the right direction. Obviously there are wins and losses, but Youth Aid officers can have a really positive effect on young lives.

The Blue Light programme delivers and supports a multitude of youth programmes nationally and has been doing so for more than 30 years. The Blue Light Life Skills programme centres on a week-long experiential-learning camp for youth aged from 14 -17 years. It is held at Burnham and is run in partnership with the NZ Defence Force, focussing on leadership training, practical skills, self-confidence, teamwork and leaderless tasks. Participants in this course can earn NCEA credits and it can also lead to opportunities to join the services. At the conclusion of this camp there is a formal ceremony which is attended by police, the Defence Force and Blue Light staff as well as the referees and families of the attendees. A proud moment for the latter!

The Blue EDGE (Educate Develop Grow Empower) is an 'in-school' programme of activity based experiential learning for young people between the ages of 14 and 18. This involves groups of up to 20 for 6 weeks with sessions on two days a week before school. This means a 6am start for fitness training, the provision of mentors and role models, inspirational guest speakers from the police and breakfast before school. The final event is "The Longest Day" which is a 12 hour period of various challenges – such as biking from Mt Cook to Caroline Bay- culminating in an awards ceremony and presentation. Timaru Boys High School and Roncalli have so far taken up the offer of this course.

The Blue Light programme also offers an activity camp for young people in years 7 & 8. The participants are nominated by their schools and get to spend three days in Queenstown, enjoying activities such as zip lining, jet boating and riding the gondola and the luge. The cost is all covered by Blue Light.

Jan loves working for the police. She likes the fact that every day is different and her fellow officers are a great group to work with. We are lucky to have her in our community.

Fuel-saving technical tips

Many of us feel the sting at the pump whenever we get fuel. Add that to the ever-increasing cost of groceries, pushing many family budgets over


Is there a way to lessen the cost without going extreme, like leaving your car at home or buying an electric vehicle? Yes, there is.

A cold engine uses more fuel. The automatic choke kicks in when you start your vehicle to make the mixture rich. This means the mixture will contain more fuel in it. Here is your first opportunity to reduce the cost by accelerating smoothly.

Another factor to consider is the lubrication inside the engine. When you turn off the engine all the oil that lubricates the moving parts flows to the sump at the bottom of the engine. Come the next day; you start the engine up. The oil pump pumps the cold, thick oil to the top of the engine. Only once the engine warms up does the oil properly lubricate all moving parts. Until this point, it is bare metal on bare metal, which is when the most wear happens.

The smoother you accelerate, the less fuel you will use. We all know how hard it is to move a loaded wheelbarrow when the wheels are underinflated. When tyres are underinflated, the engine must work harder – use more fuel.

Tyre pressure information is usually displayed on a sticker placed at the driver's door pillar. Check the pressure regularly and inflate when the tyres are still cold. Alternatively, you could go to a tyre dealer and ask them to check the pressure. Some may charge you a small fee, but they will also check the condition of your tyres. If you hit a deep pothole or bumped hard against a curb, you should get the wheel alignment checked as well.



Once the engine is warmed up, the automatic choke disengages. Now the fuel/air mixture becomes *leaner*, which means the mixture contains less fuel. It is now up to the driver to drive

Most vehicles have what is called a *second stage* on the carburettor. The carburettor is the part that mixes air and fuel. When the driver pushes hard on the accelerator pedal, the second stage kicks in to give the engine more fuel to accelerate quicker. There is a sweet spot where the vehicle gets enough fuel to speed up gradually, without the need for the **second stage** to engage. Unless you need to accelerate quickly, like when passing, there is no need to step hard on the accelerator. Once you find this *sweet spot*, you will noticeably use less fuel.

In my next article, I will discuss more ways to save fuel by driving smartly.
