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

#### "Being the only female on site can be interesting!"

And so is this enterprising young civil engineer. Katie Vincent. born and educated in Timaru at Waimataitai and Mountainview High School is carving out a name for herself in the engineering field. After leaving school, Katie completed a four year Bachelor of Engineering Honours degree at the University of Canterbury. It was unusual for a girl to pursue a career in engineering, but Katie is thriving on it. About 30 % of the students in her year were girls. Engineering appealed to her, because you can create a design on paper and then see the finished results, and she also enjoys the physical side, although this can involve hard work and long hours. Hence the comment at the beginning of this article. Katie had to prove herself in a largely male field of work. Not easy for an attractive young 20 year old trying not to step on the toes of older men with 30 or 40 years of experience!

Katie's four year degree comprised a blend of theoretical and practical work, the latter involving 800 hours of practical work experience. Engineers design the future. They provide innovative solutions to meet the needs of our modern world. From buildings and bridges, to apps and smart devices, to pharmaceuticals and renewable energy, engineering feats are everywhere. This is what attracted Katie to pursuing this course of study. Her university holidays were spent doing internships with engineering firms. She worked on the construction of flood management projects in Christchurch for Brian Perry Civil and she also had an internship with Holmes Consulting working on storm water and wastewater infrastructure and pavement design. This latter work experience led to Holmes Consulting offering Katie her first full-time job on graduation with first class honours in December last year. 




## **Relay for life Waimate**

## **SOUTH CANTERBURY TOYOTA HAVE DONE IT AGAIN**

Branch Manager Mark Patterson had the pleasure of accepting not one but two major awards at the Toyota New Zealand Dealer Awards in Dunedin on February 29th. The awards, 2019 Presidents Trophy and 2019 Toyota Dealer of The Year, would not have been possible without the fantastic team at SC Toyota and the awesome and supportive community that we all live in.













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Coast, about 80 km from Greymouth. There are currently over 600 people living there, many of whom were born there and have never known life on the outside.

The group was founded in 1969 by Neville Cooper, later renamed Hopeful Christian. In the early years they were known as the Cooperites and lived on a farm at Springbank in Canterbury. Neville had a dream that the Bible should be lived out practically and that the principles of sharing and holding all things in common were important. In the early days new members were required to share their worldly goods and all money was held in a common financial purse. All incomes went into a common kitty, which was distributed

equally according to the size of the family. However these days, the members do not have any of their own money.

No one gets paid at Gloriavale, and they sign a vow promising that if they should ever leave, they will do so without expecting any financial

Most of the community members do not realise they are receiving Working for Families Tax credits, or that income is allocated into their account and then withdrawn for the use of the community. The community has had various successful business interests over the years, including dairying, charter flights, collecting sphagnum moss, honey production, deer farms and hunting ventures and more.

The families are large, because birth control is not allowed! The community runs a private school and four Government-funded day care centres for the many children. Their education is aimed at those studies which will help the

community – so trades for men and a more basic education for women. The women spend their lives in traditional domestic roles or childcare. Some women will do distance learning to get their Early Childhood Training and some men are allowed to do Trade

All mealtimes are communal and the community runs on a strict timetable where no-one gets much free time. Everyone lives in hostels, which are set up with a large circulation space and family bedrooms all coming off this area. The bathroom facilities are shared with other families on the same hostel floor. Marriages are arranged by the leaders and the couples are usually very young and produce large families.

Gloriavale is well known for its trademark long blue dresses and head scarves for women. They are not allowed to roll up their sleeves, men must have their top button done up and definitely no hands in pockets. The community runs an amazing concert every two years, including a three course meal, as a way of spreading the word about their life. Outsiders can attend this event.

However, over the years the community has become stricter and stricter, as they feel the

world is encroaching on them. They despise vanity, competition and any disobedience. Hence some members are rebelling against the myriad of rules and regulations, some are doubting what they have been told their whole lives, and some don't feel it's a healthy place for their families. There are recent cases of men who have been excommunicated, and whose wives and children are still inside. Many wives choose to stay, because they are fearful of sending themselves and their families to hell and/or being separated from their own parents. The leavers say that it is a regime run by fear, but for the majority of people living in Gloriavale, this is all they have ever known. Their leaders exert absolute authority over every aspect of their lives and they are taught that they couldn't survive in the evil outside world if they did choose to leave.

Enter Liz Gregory, who founded The Gloriavale Leavers' Trust, which has been set up to help those who have chosen to leave Gloriavale. Liz and the Trust also work closely with people who are offering love and support to leavers in other regions. It's a great example

About seven years ago, a young ex-Gloriavale family visited her church one Sunday. Bronwyn and René Kempf and other church members realised this family needed love and support and took them under their wing. From there it has escalated with more church members, other leavers and supporters coming on board. All together nearly 150 people have left Gloriavale over the past seven years and over half have permanently established themselves in the South Canterbury region. This has been a daunting task, because most of those who have left, come out with little more than the clothes on their backs, possibly some bedding and no money.

Liz and her husband Graham have taken six families into their home for 4-6 weeks at a time to help them settle in the outside world. With help from lots of others and a very supportive church community, families have been clothed and houses furnished for them. The cost of settling one family is upwards of \$50,000. A lot of furniture, clothing and toys have been kindly donated by the local community and churches, but there is still a shortfall of approximately \$5,000-10,000 per family. This money is needed for bond and rent payments, insurance, vehicles (often vans for their large families), petrol, as well as money to get school uniforms and school supplies, food for their cupboards and personal items. Being a registered charity has given the Trust the opportunity to apply for funding grants from other groups, organisations and individuals. The Mid & South Canterbury Trust, the NZ Charitable Foundation and the AD Hally Trust have all been generous donors, as well as individuals.

The leavers have been blown away by the generosity of the local South Canterbury community. As Liz said, "When they come out here and experience kindness, it is a real challenge to their whole belief system. For families leaving, it is a big decision and I know it impacts them, because they've got loved ones inside and family they might never see again for a long time. People underestimate how overwhelming it can be". As one leaver said, "Life outside Gloriavale is a completely different world. After living your whole life learning not to make decisions and then once outside you have to make decisions about everything - decisions for yourself, decisions regarding your finances, your family, moral issues – even make decisions down to things like the way you dress". Choosing to leave the community is a huge leap of faith. "The best way I can sum it up is what it is like to have freedom. To be able to do things without having to worry what other people will think or worry all the time about getting into trouble ... it is just a different world".

The Gloriavale Leavers' Support Trust has set up a Facebook Page, and they regularly speak to local community groups to help raise awareness and funds.

#### Q. What is the fastest way to get rid of fleas on my cat or dog?

Use a high quality flea prevention, such as Advantage or Bravecto. Both have a high efficacy rate and Bravecto even lasts up to 3 months in 1 dose. This makes it easier on you and your pet as well as tying in well with worm preventions. With the changes in the weather that we have been experiencing, flea problems are expected to continue to be more of a problem. Unfortunately while home remedies might appear to work, some can cause harmful effects on your pets and most only repel the fleas while in small numbers. Vet supplied products will always be the best to use.

#### O. How often do I have to bring my cat/ dog in for its vaccinations?

For most adult cats and dogs, the typical vaccines are suitable for 3 years. Depending on the risk factors and other outside influences, it may be recommended that more frequent dosing is required eg. Cats going into catteries need to have their vaccine within the last year. If your dog is going into kennels, they will need to have the Kennel Cough vaccine up to date which is a yearly dosing. This is also highly recommended for dogs that have regular contact with foreign dogs. Puppies have a different regime for vaccinations and should be enquired from the vet.

#### Q. What age can I get my pet microchipped? If it's an old cat/dog do I still get it microchipped?

Pets can be microchipped at any age, but due to the size of puppies, it is often left till their last puppy vaccinations around 12 weeks. It is never too old for your pet to be microchipped and is necessary for council registration. In NZ we have an organisation NZCAR that oversees a nationwide database for microchipped pets. This is a one-off fee of \$15. All councils, vets, registered animal rescue organisations have access to it.

Q. If my employee has a holiday booked to Australia next month and they have told me that they want to come to work straight after, what can

You can direct your employee not to return to work. As there has been a Government directive on mandatory self-isolation upon return from overseas (except for the Pacific Islands), this is a reasonable lawful instruction to give your employee.

If your employee still decides to turn up to work despite your request, you may want to look at suspension.

You should always keep in mind your other employees and the obligations you have to them under Health and Safety legislation. If you were to let the employee return to work, you may be in breach of those obligations.

#### Q. One of my employees is at work and is visibly sick with symptoms similar to those of Coronavirus, what can I do about it?

Plan ahead for what you will do if one of your employees catches the Coronavirus.

Discuss the expectations you have of your employees prior to the Coronavirus entering your workplace.

If an employee is displaying symptoms of Coronavirus then you can direct them to leave work.

If they are displaying symptoms but are well enough to work you can direct them to work from home, this would be paid. If they are too sick to work, then their sick leave entitlements will apply.

It is an extraordinary true story of a love that emerged, against all odds, between two young people from opposite sides of the globe fighting for freedom during World War II. In the heart of Nazi-occupied Europe, two people meet fleetingly in a chance encounter. One is an underground resistance fighter; the other a prisoner of war. A crumpled note passes between these two strangers and sets them on a course that will change their lives forever.

This is the true story of Josefine Lobnik, a Yugoslav partisan heroine, and Bruce Murray, a New Zealand soldier, who, due to a succession of near-impossible coincidences, discover love in the midst of a brutal war. Woven through their tales of great bravery, daring escapes, betrayal, torture and retaliation is their remarkable love story that survived against all odds. This is an extraordinary account of two ordinary people living through the unimaginable hardship of Hitler's barbaric regime.


