



Caroline Bay Playground

Work started on the new Caroline Bay playground in March this year. We've all seen the area taking shape over the months and now it's just weeks to go until it will finally be opened with a public party on 10th December.

In the meantime the C Play team are asking us all to just resist the temptation to play for a ew more weeks.

Currently the area is still a construction site, so for people's safety and to avoid time consuming and costly repairs, they need people to keep out of the space until that opening party. So just hold on! The project has been almost seven years in the making – and it's really worth the wait.

For C Play Committee Chair, Owen Jackson, the idea was sparked by a visit to the Margaret Mahy playground in Christchurch, with his young children. He got chatting to a lady from Timaru who was there with her grand-children and they were all loving the playground.

"That's all it took to set my imagination alight," says Owen. "Why couldn't we have a playground like this that brings so much joy to families, surely other people would feel the same wav?"

Imagination is one thing, making ideas happen is another. So Owen gathered a team of equally passionate and committed people to get involved and the long process of revamping the playground began.

They have consulted the community, gone out to tender, researched local history, hit the phones to raise funds and much more. Their work has been tireless and a key part of it was putting some real consideration and research into what people needed and wanted making a playground that is accessible for all and fun for children and grown-ups alike.

Along the way they have also managed to recycle elements of the former playground. The original rubber matting was taken to Numats recycling plant in Oamaru and ground up to form the new rubber flooring for the space. The much-loved horse has been revamped in yellow and the slide and paddling pool will be making a reappearance.

"It has always been about the love for our children," says Roselyn Fauth of the C Play team. "Bringing people together, sharing stories, playing, learning, caring - ultimately building everyone up for stronger bodies and healthier minds."

The project still has finishing touches to coordinate – such as plantings, installing shade sails and BBQ facilities and story sharing signage. The story sharing includes creation stories, formation of our land, our flora and fauna, mahika kai and the port story including shipwrecks, sea rescuers, and play at the bay for over a century.



On 10th December visitors to the playground can enjoy over 40 play pieces including a bespoke lighthouse slide tower, a shipwreck, a 5 – 50m tandem flying fox, landscaping and incorporated reproductions of art work. It is set to become a much-loved community space – for children and grown-ups alike.

Roselyn, Owen and the rest of the team are all looking forward to the 10th December when they can finally see happy faces enjoying the space. It took a lot of people and a lot of work but it will be a wonderful addition to the area.



150 grams dark chocolate (72% cocoa), chopped into

395-gram tin sweetened condensed milk

1/2 cup chopped toasted hazelnuts or almond flakes

Whisk until smooth, if necessary, reheating very briefly. Set aside until cool. Add the Frangelico to the chocolate and whisk to combine.

Whip the remaining cream to soft peaks, add the cocoa and sweetened

Completely fold in the cooled chocolate and pour into the container. Freeze for 3 hours then drop in blobs of jam and ½ of the hazelnuts and swirl through gently. Freeze a further 4 hours or overnight before serving. Top with

On a quiet corner in the sleepy, seaside settlement of Waikuku Beach is a home that feels like a holiday. Waves lap and gulls call in the middle distance. Quail skitter across the tidy, sheltered lawn. Sun pours over the neat deck, through wraparound sliding doors, across smooth West Coast beech floors. But despite the epic bach vibes, this is the full-time family home of Max and Julia Warren and their young daughters Olive and Poppy.

"We live in Waikuku Beach for the lifestyle," explains Julia. "Our lives are very outdoorsy and very beach-focussed and we wanted our home to blend in with this environment and our lifestyle '

From the street, the Warrens' home is all striking angles and gently weathered larch cladding. Eye-catching yet modest. The bold Corten steel alcove around the front door gives just a hint of the savvy design within.

The couple designed the home themselves. Max, an architect, who has recently set up his own business MW Architect, had long held a dream of designing his own home. With an array of award-winning projects from which to draw inspiration and a wish-list that included optimised outdoor living space and an "amazing" kitchen for food manufacturer, Julia, the pair threw numerous ideas around before settling on their compact, threebedroom, bach-like design.

"We'd been looking for land for a while, whilst living in Christchurch," explains Julia. "We found this property in 2018. What we actually bought was an enormous macrocarpa hedge and a very old, dilapidated bach that had been here forever. Max took out everything that he could potentially reuse, like some lovely rimu and flooring, then he tied the framing to his Dad's Landcruiser and pulled the whole shack down!"

Once the property was cleared, the couple were standing on a 688m2 pile of sand. "It was all just sand," recalls Julia. "It made digging the piles really easy, but it also meant we had to bring in a huge amount of soil to get anything to grow here." It also inspired the home's moniker: Sandhill House

The only nod you'll now find to the oodles of sand are an outdoor shower secreted around the side of the house ("ideal when we're coming in from the surf") and an impressive succulent garden where enormous green, yellow and blue agave and cacti variants thrive.



Around the garden's edge, lush akeake, lancewoods and lemonwoods create a well-established border. To the south are a walnut tree, apricot, loquat and feijoas. Just off the deck, to the north, is a small, flourishing herb garden along with some greens and strawberries. "That's my kitchen garden," says Julia, an avid foodie who operates her own raw food business, Make it Raw.

"A functional kitchen was a non-negotiable for me in the design phase. I wanted an amazing kitchen with lots of storage space and a walk-in pantry where our appliances could sit, ready to go. Max's only requirement was space for a coffee machine."

All the kitchen boxes have been well and truly ticked with a single wall of black cabinetry, steel benchtops and brass hardware offset beautifully by the ply walls that envelop the kitchen and living space. Max's coffee machine, shining in the corner, is the only benchtop appliance to be seen. The leathered negresco island is a central feature, serving as a family meeting space as much as a food prep one. "The island really brings the family together. The girls will sit and draw or eat there while we're in the kitchen.'

Across the island is the bright living space, with those holiday-feel wraparound sliding doors and the gabled





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ceiling filling the room with beautiful natural light. A wall of ply nooks provides storage and work space; its practical functionality contrasting with the colourful climbing wall that dots its way up to a safety net and a sun-yellow hatch into the upstairs loft space. Up here, Julia and Max share the space for sewing and working, respectively.

"I love the way Max has incorporated a lot of fun things," says Julia. "The girls go up the climbing wall and into the net and read books up there. Then there are the colourful nail plates up on the exposed trusses, the bright yellow laundry and the yellow garage floor."

These happy pops of unexpected colour amongst the ply walls, timber floors and sleek furniture have earned the home two Resene Colour Awards this year. Sandhill House has also received a Housing Award at the 2023 New Zealand Institute of Architects Canterbury Architecture Awards.

"These awards are a nice way for Max and our builders, McKenzie Builders, to get some recognition for the hard work they put into the house," says Julia. "But it also shows that you don't have to be building a million-dollar home to engage an architect; it shows that an architect can actually save you money with clever design and good use of space whilst adding something fun with a little bit of quirkiness."





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# A Paddock of Peonies

When Jeanine and David Cassidy decided to move from Christchurch to Timaru, they talked about building a new home. But they wanted something a little bit different. Then when David spotted a house for sale in a peony paddock - they fell in love with it, forgot about building and bought the place, peony paddock and all.

So what did they know about peonies back then?

"I only knew that I loved peonies and they were my favourite flower," says Jeanine with a laugh.

That was back in 2015 and at the time she was a stayat-home mum with all three daughters at school. She was also working as a specialist bra-fitter for a well-known lingerie company – a role she had held for several years. But on moving to the peony paddock she intended to try to make a little extra income.

So in 2017 she started the peony business too – selling the flowers at markets and also trying out different peony derivatives like bath bombs and candles, soaps and confetti.

"You have to try different things and find out what works," she explains. "You gain an understanding of peonies. They're



special because they're not around for very long and people get so excited when they see them.


When it comes to the workload – spread out over the year it's not a lot says Jeanine, but it does have 'concentrated periods of work'. And at times like these the rest of the family will pitch in. Husband David is "a bit of a legend" and does a lot of work around the paddocks. And their daughters lend a hand at picking time.

Four years ago she decided to add another item to the to do list holding a fundraiser for Breast Cancer Foundation New Zealand. It was driven in part by her work as a bra-fitter. "There are so many



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women who don't go for mammograms and don't self-examine. And don't talk about it. And I thought why don't we use the peonies to raise some funds for Breast Cancer NZ."

Whilst the first fundraiser was a bit nerve wracking, it went really well. And since then it has got bigger and better each year - consistently raising around \$2000 for the Breast Cancer Foundation. As well as peony sales they have other local artisans who come along on the day – and rather than a stall fee Jeanine just asks them to donate whatever they think appropriate to the Breast Cancer Foundation.

Peonies also have a personal level of emotion for Jeanine. She recalls in detail placing deep red peonies on her father's casket before his funeral a few years ago. They were the peonies that were in bloom when he died and now every year when she sees those ones blooming in the paddock she thinks of her father.

scented ones.

"We don't sell export level peonies - they don't have pesticides or insecticides of anything like that on them – some can be a little bit rain damaged, half may flower, half may not," she explains. "They're not the typical ones you see - they're different, ones that you really don't find a lot in shops."

They sound perfectly imperfect. But has it been a big learning curve? Well, peonies are actually quite hardy plants, so they don't need a lot of looking after. But one important aspect of healthy plants is not cutting them down straight away once they have flowered. "Let them go through their natural process," she advises. "Let them go through sun and elements that's how you set them up for the next season."

"We still get excited as we sit and watch them grow from our living room," says Jeanine "They are quite phenomenal."





# **Kaiwara Homestead** and Gardens



Bruce Johns has been busy through the year getting the garden prepped for the Homestead's first open day. "Through our families brief association with Cholmondeley we recognise the sterling work they do, with total love and care for youngsters in need," he says.

Kaiwara Homestead was built in 1886. It has been modernised over the years and is now a nine-bedroom home with large living areas, but it has virtually the same shape as in 1900.

The station was purchased by Walter Macfarlane in 1877, for his son John who was 20 years old at the time. John was an industrious man who developed the 24,500 acres, from just one hill block and one paddock on the flat. At its heyday around 1910 it carried 25,000 sheep. There was a cowman/gardener, a cook and two housemaids. And there were three gardeners - now just me laments Bruce!

The Kaiwara garden was one of the premier showpieces of the Amuri. Today Kaiwara comprises 1300 hectares (3200 acres), the garden is approximately three acres, with several notable trees planted before 1900. It was purchased by Bruce and Audrey Johns 27 years ago. Now their two sons run Pedigree Angus cattle on the hills with an annual bull sale held. The 320-hectare irrigated flats carry a dairy herd with 1100 cows milked.

# Not Just LAND ROVERS

Established in 1966, the Canterbury Land Rover Owner's Club (CLROC) is one of the oldest such clubs in the country, and with a membership of about 155 owners, it is also one of the largest of its kind in New Zealand. While membership (as the name suggests) was originally restricted to the venerable Land Rover, in later years the club opened its doors to other 'serious' four wheel drive vehicles. These include big cousin, the Range Rover, Toyota Land Cruisers and Hi Lux's, Nissan Patrols along with Jeeps, of course, and other 4x4's with similar offroad capabilities.

The history of the Land Rover goes back to the immediate post WW2 years. The original prototype was actually created in 1947 on the chassis and axle of the war's proven rugged old workhorse, the Willy's Jeep. Rover company chairman, Maurice Wilks, and his brother Spencer, were the culprits. So successful were the brother's experiments in a barn down on the family farm in Wales, the company almost immediately went into production of this new and quite revolutionary 4x4. The Land Rover Series 1 was rolled out by the former bicycle manufacturing company the following year. The rest is very much motoring history.

Today, CLROC is very much an active club promoting the virtues (and dare we say vices) of this iconic and sometimes maligned (by the uninformed of course) marque.

"My old '53 is noisy, uncomfortable and underpowered, but it gets me where nothing else will," said one rather proud owner. "I love the old girl."

That basically sums up the earlier Rovers at least. Like the Jeep they were semi-cloned from, they were rather utilitarian, a bit rough around the edges some might say, but very functional. Today, they are a lot more sophisticated, but the functionality is inbred, and that's the driving force (pun intended) behind CLROC – getting out there and doing it.

The club organizes regular events, such as driver training and expeditions to explore many of the amazing four-wheel drive tracks around the country, including venturing into the High Country and the myriad of river beds in Canterbury and further afield. In conjunction with the day runs, CLROC runs popular camping trips of varying durations to a wide variety of destinations. Camaraderie and the love of Land Rover and four-wheel driving are the glues that hold the club together.

Former Canterbury Land Rover Owner's Club Chairman and stalwart, Dave Lockett joined the club in 2006 and has been an active member ever since. "I have enjoyed a hell of a lot of trips since joining the club, and it's the members that make those trips enjoyable. I

would consider myself a regular Trip Leader running at least 5 outings a year. I'm probably best known for my winter trips to the Lake Tekapo area and Hanmer Springs looking for snow to play in. We've had some epic snow experiences over the years. The Tekapo trip is very popular with at least 30 trucks attending most times. Hanmer, while not quite as big, normally manages 20 trucks and that event is organized around a very popular Saturday night Pot Luck tea. It's a great family gathering."

"CLROC has always focused on enjoying the outdoors with families. Generations have grown up in the club and are now driving their own vehicles. Sons and daughters, and even grandchildren, have joined their grandparents in the club. The great support from experienced members, to help newbie's learn valuable off-road driving skills and the safe way to enjoy what we do is priceless," Dave maintains.
